Update from St. Therese of the Child Jesus—Our Sister Parish in Haiti

The following is an update from Fr. Paul Dorlean, the pastor of our sister parish, St. Therese of the Child Jesus, in Gonaives, Haiti.

"I present my religious greetings. I come to inform you that the parish of St. Teresa of the Child Jesus of Gonaives planned several activities during the summer to provoke a pastoral awakening. The most spectacular event was the realization of the summer camp which brought together about 75 young people and children of the area. I come to thank you for the funding of this activity so important for the young people and children of the zone. In general, children in the area are being tortured by hunger. Parents have neither the time nor the means to feed them properly. This one-month camp is the opportunity to feed and maintain them and introduce them to prayer and sharing God's word in a climate free from risk of contamination. This camp is part of a pastoral approach to offer accompaniment to young people and children, taking into account the existential reality of each age group. I also thank you for the grant for the complete finishing of the parish's school. The doors of the school opened in September. Thank you for the support you give to us! May the God of mercy always be with you all!"

We will continue to update you on the news from our sister parish and ask that you continue to pray for our Haitian brothers and sisters, especially as they deal with the effects of Hurricane Irma.



Our Call to Evangelize

More than likely, none of us have ever considered calling ourselves an evangelist. For we have not written a Gospel like Mathew, Mark, Luke, or John did. The large majority of us wouldn't even think of going on national TV, preaching from the Bible, and asking for contributions to support our ministry. And going door to door, two by two, passing out pamphlets, is probably not on our bucket list either.

However, we as Catholics, are all called to be evangelists. In fact, we were baptized to evangelize. For to evangelize simply means to intentionally answer the call to be a visible sign and an instrument of God's love, mercy, and presence in the world. Exercising this vocation starts right where we are: in our families, in our parishes, where we work, and wherever we are in the world in which we live.

To effectively answer this call from God, we must first give witness or reflect Christ's presence in our lives through what we do and through what we say. This starts by making a conscious effort to turn away from all sin and to embrace the merciful kindness and unconditional forgiveness that God extends to us as free gifts, especially through the sacraments of the Holy Eucharist and Reconciliation.

To be an effective evangelist, we must first be a true believer. Being a believer means more than just believing that God exists or that Jesus is God and that he died and rose again. A believer is someone who has put their faith in Christ for the unearned gift of salvation that only Jesus can give and who puts their trust in everything that Jesus taught. The believer has embraced the truth that their own goodness is insufficient and that they are in need of God's free gift of grace in order to be viewed as righteous in God's eyes.

An evangelist does not have to be a gifted theologian, but rather a person who is willing to surrender to and to obey the guidance of the Holy Spirit alive within them. He or she is not afraid of this because they trust that the Lord will supply whatever spiritual gifts are needed to carry out whatever it is they might be asked to do.

It is the Holy Spirit who is the principle agent of evangelization, no matter whom the believer may be. We act or speak as guided by the Spirit, and it is the third person of the Holy Trinity that actually moves the heart of the receiver to respond to the word or action God offers through the evangelizer.

The Church exists to evangelize. As such, evangelizing is not an option for a true disciple of Christ. Jesus told us to go make disciples of all nations; in other words, everyone needs to be evangelized. The desire and the willingness to evangelize, in themselves, are gifts that the Holy Spirit inspires within us. God's goal in all evangelization, is to use us as instruments through which he draws others to, or closer to, his son Jesus and to his body, the Church.

Being an evangelist always starts with our actions as they speak louder than words. For if our actions do not give witness to Christ's presence within us, others will not pay any attention to our words. But sooner or later, the heart of an evangelizer is called to the mature conviction by the Holy Spirit that they have an obligation to speak the name of Jesus to others so that others will call upon Jesus to share in his loving kindness, his forgiving mercy, and his saving grace.

In St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians, we read that the ultimate goal of our God is to bring all things into union with Christ. Without each of us saying "yes" to God's call for us to evangelize, this is not going to happen as our heavenly Father wills it be.

Without the fire of God's love personally burning within us, none of us have the capacity to fully answer our baptismal call to evangelize. Thus, we must pray for ourselves and all our brothers and sisters that God the Holy Spirit will enflame our hearts with the desire to evangelize in accordance with the mind and heart of Christ.

Jesus, baptize us in the Holy Spirit! Holy Spirit, giver of all spiritual gifts, fill and anoint us with your power and unite us in opening and sharing the gift of our call to evangelize!
